

Dear friends,

My phone has a habit of showing me clips from old comedy programmes. I don't know how or why it does it (I guess I must have googled something once), but I must say I am very grateful for them. When a day is proving particularly testing, there's no better tonic than three minutes of Fawlty Towers, The Two Ronnies, or The Vicar of Dibley. Speaking of which ... it does sometimes feel as if Dibley is not such a fictional place after all!

One of the Dibley episodes is called "Spring". It's time for Alice and Hugo's baby to be christened. As Geraldine is one of the godparents the Bishop arrives to perform the ceremony. Somewhat surprisingly David proposes marriage to Geraldine, who says that she will consider it. However, after Sean Bean has appeared to her in a dream telling her not to go through with it, she turns David down!

Life certainly has its disappointments! Not to mention

things that give us cause to worry. A friend and I were chatting the other day, and noting all the anxieties in people's lives - Ukraine, climate change, the cost of living, the NHS, social media, etc. He felt that a lot of these big anxieties are manifesting in our personal interactions, and I think he may have a point. Deanery Walk

The major event in our calendar is the forthcoming coronation of King Charles III to be held on May 6th. This traditional ceremony is an important aspect of the fabric of Britain's cultural and political history. It is a cause for celebration. We will be holding a Celebration Service on Sunday May 7th at 11:00 am, followed by activities organised by our Parish Council. There will be more details closer to the time of the event. Please join us to celebrate this historic occasion.

Have you noticed the churchyard this early spring? The snowdrops are prolific as a result of the hard work by Ben and Connor clearing the leaves in the autumn and



early winter. At the time of writing the primroses are beginning to bloom and hopefully they will grace us with splendid, colourful displays as we approach the summer months. Our garden receives many compliments in our visitors' book, and we are grateful to those who help us maintain the churchyard.



Our church is heavily reliant on the work of volunteers supporting the day to day functionality of our church. We are blessed with talented volunteers who create the seasonal floral arrangements in and around the church. We are thankful for the people who keep the church clean and tidy, which is not an easy task. We are fortunate for the contribution of the members of our PCC who bring a variety of talents to the life of our church. We need to recognise that society in general is increasingly reliant on volunteer work because of increased complexity and the diverse and rapidly changing needs of our citizens. In recognition of their contribution we will organise a special thanksgiving service for the many volunteers, not just those associated with the church, in Weston. We are hoping to incorporate a communal meal into the celebration.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) will be held on Tuesday May 2nd at 7:30 pm at the Village Hall. We have opted for the Village Hall this year in an attempt to increase attendance. Members of the Electoral Roll and the Stewardship Roll will receive invitations, which will include an information pack outlining the financial status and the plans for the church in our Weston community. The meeting is open to the general public and suitable publicity will be posted closer to the event. This is an important meeting, which can help the church move forward and increase its participation in our community. This will be a short meeting followed by some wine and canapes. We sincerely hope you will join us for this occasion.

NEWS FLASH: The church reduced its carbon footprint by 40% in 2022! We emitted 0.6 ton of CO2, in 2022 down from 1 ton in 2021. Every ounce counts.

Chair's comments

ARISH COUNCILS should not be static bodies but should evolve and reflect the changing demographic of the village. Since we last went to election, the council has seen some changes in membership and this year we felt it was time to get a full complement of councillors which is eight. We have managed with six councillors for several years and have found it difficult to cover the range of tasks needed.

In the time following Covid, we have reached into the community to encourage people to put themselves forward to join the council. We've been very successful in that we have coopted two new councillors since the start of the year. We have a third individual requesting cooption at the next meeting which is April 5th and past the deadline for this article!

Ben Lanham was co-opted at 1st February 2023 Parish Council meeting. He, Kate and three children have lived in the village since 2019. Ben grew up in Abingdon where he was captain at the cricket club for several years and on the club committee assisting with the running of the club and local activities. Ben is a Senior Forensic Scientist and Team Leader and as such will bring to the council a wide range of skills. He is currently a Trustee of the Chesterton Play Group. Ben is keen to be involved in a variety of opportunities on the council including the development of the playground and the spinney which seem to hold a lot of his interest! He would like to contribute to the future of the village.

Jack Maxton was co-opted at 1st March 2023 Parish Council meeting. Jack and Andrew moved into the village in spring of 2022 and felt at home very quickly. Jack is a director for a high growing Strategy & Digital Consultancy company and is used to business planning and growth efforts in new markets. He has previous experiences of village life and feels that Weston on the Green has all

the attributes of a lovely place to live. He summed up his desire to make a difference by the following statement: "I am motivated by the opportunity to join the council to use my skills to develop and enhance the village, championing our needs in a complex and changing landscape of developments, planning, transport, technology, and new services. I can help us to cut through this complex picture and ensure we are developing our vibrant, welcoming village".

People's lives move on and often require a shifting of responsibilities. Such is the case of Neil Mullane who has resigned having served this village as a councillor for six years. His leadership on the Traffic Calming Advisory Group has driven the work forward. It is no secret that he is known as "Mr. Twenty's Plenty"! The next piece of the traffic puzzle requires someone of his patience and foresight and I'm sure they're out there. We have valued Neil's clear and insightful comments at our parish council meetings. He has been easy to get along with and has led people with efficiency and humour. Thank you, Neil, for your generous service to the community. You have set a fine example for future councillors.

for the journey but that will be reviewed for the new financial year. Remember – use it or lose it!

Neighbourhood Plan and Survey

The Parish Council is reviewing the Neighbourhood Plan to conform with the updated Cherwell Local Plan which is now in advanced draft form and should come into effect at the end of 2024. In the meantime, the housing and land supply targets have been revised which means that our Neighbourhood Plan also needs some review.

While this will be of limited scope, we are also planning a major review to come into effect after 2024 when the newly adopted Local Plan will include new strategic policies in housing supply and biodiversity. We will be circulating a survey to establish the current priorities for parish residents and businesses so that these can be reflected in our policies. A draft survey has been compiled and will be tabled for approval at the April 2023 Parish Council meeting. Please look out for this coming to every door and we need and welcome your views through your answers.

The parish continues to be under pressure from development of greenspace land both in and around the parish, most recently by a housing development proposal of 147 dwellings at Chesterton. The extra pressure that this will exert on traffic density in and around our


parish, healthcare in our region and other infrastructure, should not be underestimated and we continue to voice our concerns directly to Cherwell District Council and through other consultations.

Annual Village Meeting (Save the date!)

The Annual Village Meeting will be held on April 18th, 2023, at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. This meeting will specifically review the highlights of the past year and provide an opportunity to comment on future plans. Topics: Impact of development in our area, Technology, Transport and traffic, Jubilee playing field and water courses through the village. There will also be an opportunity to hear from the SOS (Save our Shop) Committee.

Food Bank

Thank you for being so generous with the March food bank collection. We donated 137.10kg of food. When we got to the Bicester Food Bank, we were shocked at how empty the shelves were. We'll continue collecting food on the first Saturday of the month in front of the shop, April 1st, June 3rd (not the day of the coronation in May).



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Advance Notice of Road Closure

A4095 Kirtlington Road for Great Wolf Development Works

OCC have advised of a road closure to a section of A4095 Kirtlington Road (between B430 Oxford Road and B4030 Vendee Drive) whilst essential S278 highway works and installation of new services for the Great Wolf Lodge development works are undertaken. The temporary closure will operate from 24th April 2023 up to and including 21st July 2023. This is a 24-hour road closure.

Voter ID – New Requirements

The government now requires voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station. This will apply for the first time when the district council elections happen on 4th May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

- Passport
- Driving licence
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)

You can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk. Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form.

T IS with great pleasure that I write to you, the villagers of Weston on the Green, as the appointed Chair of the newly founded Weston SOS ('Save our Shop') Committee, following our initial meeting on the 27th of February.

Despite being a successful, viable business and hub of the community (even in the wake of COVID and recent postal strikes), the current owner, Yasemin, is now looking to sell the Weston Pantry. Her concern, and one that was felt by the rest of the village at the village meeting on the 22nd of February, is that a new owner may not be so community-focused; or that the shop may eventually be converted into a residential dwelling and lost as an amenity to the village completely.

Huge impact

I wish to reiterate the comments of support for her during the meeting – it is clear she has made a huge impact on the village and grown it as a hub for the residents and businesses of Weston and surrounding villages alike. I would also like to thank Diane for organising and chairing the village meeting and those that spoke as this was the catalyst for our existence.

I hope that I can serve you, the village and the committee to preserve the future of the shop and post office as I was moved and buoyed by the outpouring of support in its favour at the village meeting. For those that couldn't attend, the official record will be posted to our website (see below).

Weston SOS has been formed with a simple aim in mind – to maintain a Shop and Post Office amenity and ensure it serves as a community hub within the village.

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The Village Hall!

IFTY YEARS AGO, in May 1973, the present village hall was officially opened. It was a replacement for the original hall, opened in 1921 and dedicated to the memory of those who lost their lives during the First World War. This had been a second hand, wooden hut and was itself a replacement for the Reading Room which had stood in the courtyard of the Vicarage and provided, during the winter months, since at least 1910, a place where club members could enjoy a hot drink and the newspapers. We were one of the first villages in the district to get a Village Hall in the post-war move to provide a central place for each community.

A committee set dates of opening, arranged entertainments and provided both cleaning, lamp oil, fire lighting and general upkeep as well as maintaining a presence at each open session. The hall had been built on land donated by Mr T Read, who had bought the site at the village sale in 1918. There had once been a cottage on the site, destroyed by fire many years before. This cottage had been the home of one of Weston's 'night schools' and the hall built on the site became an extra classroom for the village school, both when overflowing and when evacuated



children arrived in the village in 1939.


The ground around the hall was let as a garden and, during the Second World War, it was part of the 'Dig for Victory' scheme. The names of those who did not return in 1945 were added to the original dedication.

Membership had been 1/- a month and there was a monthly dance, a smaller Saturday night hop and weekly drama classes, keep fit and folk dancing. There was a piano and a local band would be hired for dances and the aerial strung across the hall roof,

between two trees, gave access to 2LO radio for dance music. At one point the club membership was over 80 members and over 100 regularly attended the dances. Whist drives, film shows, socials, pantomimes, tea parties, civil defence meetings, a library, Parish Council meetings and concerts were all remembered during the lifetime of the old hall.

During the Second World War the hall was the workplace of the Bristol Packing Mamas – ladies who packed airplane parts for distribution across the country. The wooden packing cases were covered with cloths and moved to the sides of the hall whenever there was a dance. How the old floorboards supported the weight was a small miracle and the brick piles underneath were regularly checked.

The youth of the village had a billiard table, and all ages were provided for; from babes in arms attending the clinic, through toddler groups, playgroups, afterschool activities, Sunday School and the Horticultural Society to national groups like the Brownies, Guides, and the WI.



50th Anniversary



In the early 1970s, after 50 years of service, the hall was well past it's sell-by date (although it was passed on to a Scout Group, once dismantled) and the village needed to raise the money to fund a new hall. By this time the 'men only' membership and winter only opening hours had long gone. The committee set about fundraising. They were aiming for just what we got - purpose brick built, good heating, lighting and a sprung floor for dancing. Unlike the old hall, there would now be a fully working kitchen and toilets. Previously, waste water from washing cups after a social event was thrown into the hedge of the nearest cottage. I dread to think about previous toilet facilities.

Funds for the Old Hall had been raised by Captain Margesson, then living at the Manor, and others in the village, gathering donations and holding fund-raising events like whist drives and social teas.

This time round one of the major fund-raising efforts involved a group of women who put on short entertainments. Their fame spread and they would travel quite long distances to give hour-long shows. Named The Reviewers, they gave their last performance in the newly opened hall.

A Village Weekend was organised with displays of old crafts illustrating the rural way of life which was fast disappearing and the 250 club was started – a lottery well before the National Lottery began. Other fund-raising activities included a series of postcards, local history leaflets, dances and produce sales.

Those who had worked so hard were rewarded with a celebratory dinner at Weston Manor and the official opening of the new hall was followed by a dance, despite the lack of a dance floor which had not yet been laid.

Since the building of the present hall it has been used by many: the WI, the Horticultural Society, Sunday School, Playgroup, Brownies, Guides, Rangers, Haywains, bowls, youth club, exhibitions, fund-raising for charities as well as the hall itself, services of worship, Oxford touring theatre and amateur productions and pantomimes, fairs and bazaars, parties and private functions, business meetings, computer and craft classes – the list is endless.

For over 100 years a committee of dedicated volunteers has continued to earn the appreciation of the village. Their efforts have ensured we have a flourishing hall – both as a Memorial to those who gave their lives during two conflicts and a community asset for those living here now.

Spring thoughts

It also has books of walks, details of all the walking groups in the county and much more. Whether you want to walk on your own or with a group all the information is there in one place.



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Fires and how to light them

Noting that kindling is being burnt faster than supply, herewith is a short guide on fires and how to light them

Before attempting to light the fire, check the following:

- You have to hand, firelighters, kindling of sufficient amount and length to fit neatly into fire hole and either dry logs or coal.
- Note that logs and coal can be obtained from parents or gullible neighbours.
- Ensure that flue is not blocked by falls of soot or petrified birds (not frightened, fossilised)
- Thoroughly clean out ash tray and ensure fire bars are clean.
- Ensure that air slide at bottom of fire bars is wide open.
- Insert firelighter and set it alight. Make sure you have permission from a responsible adult before you use matches.
- Carefully lay kindling over firelighter to form a nest-like cluster about 3 sticks deep. A bit like a Jenga stack.
- Close door and allow this to mature into a steady blaze.



- Open door carefully and shovel on several heaps of coal, ensuring it is heaped on top of the blazing kindling and not just sat at the front getting warm. Alternatively, place on logs instead of coal.
- Close door and allow fire to burn up to welding heat.
- Close air slide and the fire will tick over nicely.
- Before applying more fuel open air slider to ensure draught from below.

• Open bottle of wine and sit and contemplate, or just sit.

Here endeth the first lesson. In lesson two we will be dealing with house fires and when to call the fire brigade out!

Lesson three will deal with insurance and why you should have had some before attempting the practical module of lesson one.



Early birds

The bonus of the going to Oxford at that time of the morning is that most of the shops are closed and there's not many people about. 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Buzzards and Flying Teaspoons.

For the last few years I've often seen a pair of buzzards sitting in trees or on top of hedges near the airfield. On a warm summer's day they would be soaring effortlessly on the thermals looking out for young rabbits. But in winter it's easier for them to scavenge on 'road kill' and this is what one of them was doing near the Akeman Street junction a few weeks ago.

Unfortunately, they are not a bird that can quickly fly off and this one was hit by a car and left lying in the middle of the road. I thought it might possibly be still alive and stopped to pick it up. There was hardly a mark on it but it was definitely dead. I took it home and gave it a proper burial in the 'wild-life and pets cemetery' at the bottom of the garden but not before taking a few pictures of it.

Back to ornithology. No news of the barn owls - they are using the nest box in our roof to roost in during the day but have yet to lay any eggs (end of March, early April is the normal time for this). I'm spending a small fortune on bird food and the highlight so far this year has been the gangs of long-tailed tits that seem addicted to the suet balls. The record currently stands at ten birds on one feeder. Groups of birds have such wonderful collective nouns,



such as a 'charm of goldfinches', a 'clattering of jackdaws' and a 'banditry of long-tailed tits' – I especially like that one as they do go round like a gang of excited

schoolchildren. They also have the nickname of being called 'flying teaspoons' – very appropriate.

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
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John Howell MP writes...



N ORDER TO MEET the copy deadlines for many of the parish magazines published in communities across the constituency I have to write in the first part of the month. This month my deadline comes ahead of the Spring Budget which I know many await, hoping that some of the Government support towards the cost of living will continue. Much is widely heralded, and I have no advanced insights beyond those already published in the media. However I am optimistic that the energy support will be extended to get us through the rest of the colder months this year. As always there will be much comment in the public domain when the Budget Statement is made by the Chancellor and the Treasury publish the details.

Most people will have received the energy support automatically through their energy provider. However there are a number of households not on mainstream supply or who have other specific arrangements, such as Park Homes. In February the alternative scheme to ensure that support is available to such households went live for everyone and applications for support to the Alternative Energy Support Scheme. can be made online.

With the coming of Spring we are perhaps a little more aware of the countryside around us and in recent weeks I have had

a number of people contact me to comment on the litter that we see on verges and in other public places. I agree that this is an eyesore and we need to keep drawing attention to the need for people to take their rubbish home or use the bins provided. In recognition of the problem the Government published its National Litter Strategy in 2017 which set out a number of ways to tackle the problem. This has been regularly reviewed and initiatives such as The Great British Beach Clean and the Great British Spring Clean have been well support by volunteers across the country. This year the Great British Spring Clean will take place between Friday 17 March and Sunday 2 April. Our District Councils take the lead on this and you can find full details on this, including health and safety advice, information on loan of equipment and collection of filled bags on SODC website. As far as I can see Cherwell has yet to publish information.

Thankfully most of our children progress through mainstream education with little problem. However there are some children who have special educational needs and I know that accessing this is not always easy. The delays can cause considerable stress for children and their families and the time lost can be critical. This is not just a local problem and the Department for Education has been looking to see what changes

need to be made to improve the system. Following consultation the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and Alternative Provision (AP) Improvement Plan has just been published with the aim of ensuring that the right support is given at the right time and in the right place. This is fully supported by the Department for Health and Social Care. There is much work to be done in this area but the publication of this plan and the associated measures for improvement are an important step in the right direction. It is backed with substantial funding and oversight of reform will be provided through a new national special educational needs and disabilities and alternative provision implementation board, chaired by senior ministers.

There are, of course, many big issues which affect us all which are will rehearsed in the national media and which the government is already working to address. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts. Launton & Otmoor District Update March 2023

Spring really is just round the corner hopefully, although the recent cold snap reminded us that winter had not quite given up yet. As always, we hope you are staying safe.

London Road level crossing

Some of you have asked how this is progressing, and the sorry answer is, very slowly. We are committed to keeping the crossing open to avoid cutting off half of Bicester and requiring people to go round the ring road to get to the other side of town. There are several options which keep coming to the table, yet no decision has yet been made. These include an overpass or underpass for pedestrians and vehicles, or a cycle and foot bridge only. There are more consultations planned, and we meet regularly with EWR to question them on this. We have support from OCC members on this as well. This missed opportunity when the Bicester Town station was re-developed is a real pain point for all us and we will continue to represent your views on this and push to a resolution, with a recent motion passed at the full Council meeting in February.



Local housing land supply and the Local Plan

As we mentioned last month, the Local Plan came before the Leadership Executive committee at CDC and a decision was postponed indefinitely while they considered comments from the Overview and Scrutiny committee. No change there I am afraid, however one positive development (no pun intended) to note is a new Housing Land Supply figure was agreed.

The UK government requires councils to plan for and accommodate a housing land supply that exceeds 5 years. Essentially calculating the number of houses needed and the amount of land available in the area. We have been short on that figure, 3.5 years, and so speculative development has been fairly rampant, including in Launton, as developers point at this and say "you need to build these houses anywhere". The CDC Executive recently passed a revised land supply figure of 5.4 years due to a number of recent changes. Pending ratification by

HM Planning Inspectorate, this will close that "loophole" and should make this development much more difficult to approve.

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

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




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
