A letter from the Rector

Dear friends.

In one of our schools this past term we've been thinking about 'respect' and in another about 'love'. These two come together as we approach Christmas and the new year.

When I was preparing a school assembly on the theme of respect, a proverb I was taught as a child came to mind: "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me." While understanding the encouragement to resilience, I am not sure that the underlying sentiment is true. Names do hurt. and the coarsening of our public discourse and the ease with which people resort to name-calling on social media should be a cause of concern for us all. The example set by politicians, at home and

abroad, is not encouraging. If you are ever tempted (as I have been) to bad-mouth someone via Facebook or Twitter, please try to resist. It devalues the target of your venom, but it debases you too.

At Christmas, we remember another kind of name-calling: "His name shall be called Emmanuel – God with us." Love embodied, so that we might imbibe and embody that same love. St John writes: "God is Love, and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them." (1 John 4.16). Christina Rossetti put it like this:

Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, love divine; Love was born at Christmas, Star and angels gave the sign.

2022 has been yet another year of turmoil on the national and

international stage. We need a lot more love and a lot more respect. But it begins when we start practising it ourselves:

Love shall be our token, Love be yours and love be mine; Love to God and all men, Love for plea and gift and sign.

We delayed one Parish Share¹ payment, and suspended Benefice Fees² payments to conserve our cash reserves. If we include those costs our operating surplus in 2022 reduces from £2,083 to a deficit of £635.

Chair's comments

HALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES have been the ongoing thread of the work of the Parish Council over the past two months.

We have continued to be challenged by the issue of the pathway in front of the veteran oak tree at the top of North Lane. We are encouraged that Oxfordshire County Council are intending to undertake the construction of the new path and the demolition of the built path. This is contingent on the total cost of the works not exceeding £25k and confirmation that the Direct Works team have the capacity. We have suggested that the replacement path could be built fairly quickly and the railings which obscure visibility be removed. Demolition of the built structure would follow and remedial work to the tree carried out. We are moving forward ever so slowly to a conclusion of this lengthy issue.

We have ahead of us the excitement about our community transport van. Hopefully, the van will provide an opportunity for people who feel housebound to get out occasionally. We are also pleased that the Welcome Kits are ready for delivery. We hope to be able to speak with those who have moved into the village since the start of the pandemic. If you get a knock on your door from a Parish Councillor welcoming you to the village even though you've been here for three years – please welcome us! We hope that you will share your contact details and areas of interest with us. We are, of course, hoping to find additional talents and skills from amongst the 'newcomers'!

CHERWELL DISTRICT COUNCIL LOCAL PLAN

The CDC Local Plan draft will have a formal 8 week consultation from 14th December 2022 to 8th February 2023. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Parish Council attended a briefing on the document.

Objectives of the CDC Local Plan update

The new Local Plan will present a plan for the overall future of Cherwell in the period 2020 – 2040, not just housing numbers. Main objectives are climate change/sustainable development, building healthy sustainable communities and maintaining and developing a sustainable local economy. The new Local Plan will also replace the saved policies carried forward from the 1996 plan.

CDC has a spatial vision for Cherwell. This is a portrait of what Cherwell will look like in 2040. The main points are:

- Banbury and Bicester are the main focus for development, including the Garden Town at Bicester. Other associated areas of development will be Kidlington and Heyford Park, where development will include new highway and other infrastructure. Development of more than 100 homes will be limited to these sites.
- Rural areas will be protected and development will be smaller in scale and directed to more sustainable villages.

Policies in the new CDC Local Plan

There will be new policies on environmental protection, biodiversity net gain, sustainable and climate resilient construction, historic assets, local character and design.

Housing need:

A technical assessment of

housing need is being done by the Oxfordshire Growth Need Assessment (OGNA) group – they will report shortly. The current estimates are that 22,508 homes are already planned in Cherwell. A further 4,400 homes are needed to meet Oxfords unmet housing need and a contingency of 15% additional homes is budgeted into the LP. This makes a total of 6,800 more homes needed to be built by 2040.

With these numbers, it is unlikely that extensive land release will be needed. A shortlist of potential strategic sites will be established (the long list is 61 sites – most will not meet the sustainability criteria).

Rural Areas:

There will be no global housing target for rural areas as a whole. These areas will have development on non-strategic sites, limited to the 'larger' villages. The settlement hierarchy of villages is being reviewed and any village without public transport will not be classified as sustainable. Further criteria in this review include the availability of services such as schools, shops, pubs, GPs, pharmacies, places of worship, play areas, outdoor community spaces, village halls. Non-allocated development outside existing villages will not be supported (but for rural exceptions where justified). Development in smaller villages will be limited to 'infill'.

All parishes will be asked to identify potential development sites. Some smaller parishes may or may not identify any sites. It is important that we are involved in the consultation as the future of our village is at stake.

FULL-FIBRE UPDATE

Openreach: We have not heard from Openreach for a while. The DCMS (Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport) funding remains unapproved for our project and Openreach have been unsuccessful in appealing this. At the same time, the Oxfordshire rural voucher top up scheme has no money left in the budget. We are waiting on news for the next budget-year.

Gigaclear: In separate news, Gigaclear have informed the Parish Council that they intend to completely self-fund installing full-fibre infrastructure into our village. They are currently in Kirtlington and Bletchingdon and will expand their network from there to us. In a nutshell, this means that we could have a full-fibre service as soon as April next year (2023).

The current package is as follows:

- Up/down speeds are the same (the service is symmetrical).
- Residential Packages offer 200, 300, 600, 900 Mbps (up and down)
 - Most people will only want the 200 Mbps service which

- is £ 17/month for 18 months then £40/month thereafter. £17/month is the lowest rate we have seen. £40/month is 'in the mix' for a 200 Mbps service
- There is no connection fee for most premises (95%). This will be assessed at the point of application, but costs are normally for premises with an extremely long driveway, for example.
- A Linksys Velop modem/router will be provided.
 - Note: You will need 2 power sockets (one for the modem/ router, and one for the fibreethernet converter (which sits between the modem/router and the fibre cable coming through the wall).
 - Note: If you want to maintain WIFI connectivity during a power cut, both of these devices will need a battery backup.
- The vulnerable will receive a battery backup for free.
- Entry point to the premises can be set (subject to reason) for free. This means you can choose an entry-point near a power supply needed to power the router, fibre-ethernet converter and back-up battery (if you want to use one).
- A free community hub will be provided with a 900Mbps business package for free.
- The Church may also receive a free package we are waiting confirmation on this.


Gigaclear made it clear that they want to engage with the Parish

Council and the entire community. To this end, we will be organising open days in the Village Hall for both the afternoon and evenings (to accommodate all villagers). We expect to do this early in the new year. We can also arrange some online events for those who want to isolate.

Important take-aways:

- You do not have to take up a Gigaclear contract
- Gigaclear will have a monopoly on full fibre
 - As long as Openreach does not implement anything.
 - The offer is currently very competitive, but Gigaclear's prices long-term are unknown
- Fibre-to-the-premises needs a power supply
 - Think about where you want the service to enter your premises
 - Check that a battery-backup is included in the package if/ when you apply
- Fibre does not guarantee coverage within the home
 - Consider your WIFI coverage within your home
 - Gigaclear will provide a new Linksys router. This may be more powerful than your current router, but we cannot confirm this right now.
- This is not an endorsement for Gigaclear
 - We will be seeking feedback from users in other villages

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Ash Die-Back in the Jubilee Playing Fields Spinney

Unfortunately the Parish Council has to report that in the last two or three years ash die-back has attacked almost all the ash trees in the spinney. The trees lose leaves, then the dead branches come down in the wind and finally the trees themselves become unsafe after several years.

The suspect trees in the spinney have been dot-marked (31 in total) - yellow for obviously infected and red for urgent action necessary. The recommendation from a tree specialist is to fell all 31 trees at the same time, which would be the most economic way of dealing with the problem.

The Parish Council has appointed a tree specialist to carry out the work and this will be undertaken as soon as the company is available, likely to be in the new year. Notification will be provided to the village when we know when the work is expected to take place.

Coordinator: We need a coordinator to manage the fare system and take phone bookings.





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

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AROL SINGING became a feature of life at Christmas in Weston for 45 years. This began in 1968, when a group of women sang carols to raise money in a good cause – the terrible plight of children in Biafra. Singing at about 40 homes they raised £6 10s

From this small beginning the tradition grew. Sometimes there would be 15 to 20 singers – men, women and youngsters and, in order to cover all the village (about 200 homes), singing took place on three nights during the week before Christmas. Each night an appointed leader kept everyone under control – singing the same carol, the same verse and following the route for that night and most importantly giving the correct note to begin singing. It also helped if you knew potholes and trip hazards – here I speak with experience; being horizontal but still holding the collection tin or on another occasion being lifted over huge puddles by strapping teenage boys – memories that will forever be associated with carol singing. When invited to sing in the minstrel's gallery at Weston Manor this involved a fourth night, but the acoustics made us sound much better than we really were!

Following a two hour session each night came supper. The tradition of hostesses, supplying cups of soup, nibbles and mince pies each evening to the sometimes wet or frozen singers grew and this part of the evening became a social event. We would sing one last time that night 'for our supper' and the night's collection was counted. We had all trudged through puddles, against cold winds, down long driveways, evaded farm animals and dogs and rattled the tins; it was

Over the years the youngsters became adults with families of their own and, of course some adults who sang in 1968 became senior citizens who preferred to offer refreshments rather than sing each night. We celebrated 40 years of singing with a concert in the village hall, showcasing many musical talents including not-quite-perfect hand-bell ringing

Seasonal decline

The demise of this Christmas tradition came after the 2013 'season'. The problem was not just a lack of volunteers willing to commit 1, 2 or 3 nights, but also changing lifestyles. Often, singing heartily at a door, only to find that although the lights



were on, no one was at home, the singers would trudge on to the next door, their throats dry and the tin no heavier. In comparison to 1968, 21st century people are often out in the evening. Without younger singers volunteering to give of their time and voices it was decided to 'cease trading'. After 45 years, the tradition was broken; all those who had taken part – some for all those years, others for just a few sessions can be proud of the one over-riding fact – they raised over £11,000 for many charities.

After that first year, 'for Biafra', the charities were many and varied. Other overseas projects or disasters were supported as well as local 'good causes' like our own church and village hall. Children's charities often featured and the group supported both small local projects as well as the 'big' charities like Macmillan Nurses and Cancer UK.

When they began singing, they used a small carol sheet – small print, flimsy paper – which often ended up in dubious 'puddles' in a farmyard, sometimes so stained as to be unreadable. Later we progressed to laminated sheets – drop it anywhere, wipe it clean for the next night! One elderly

resident taught us the tune to a carol (Like Silver Lamps...) not previously tried and it became a favourite of some regular singers, other carols never made it into our top ten – 'From Jesse's Stock Up-springing...' or 'A Virgin unspotted...' – do you know them?

La-la land

the words on the sheets. Singing in the dark, with only a failing torch to illuminate the page, does aid the memory and some can remember all the words to all the verses to nearly all the carols – just give them the first line and they are away! One leader, who rarely used a torch, was famous for calling 'first, second and last' when starting a carol, thus limiting the singing to the three verses we were certain to remember. If this failed, you could 'la-la' to the tune!

For a while, singing at events in both the village hall and the Chequers continued in the years after 2013. Now it is up to another generation to revive the tradition — if they want to.



Weston-on-the-Green WI

Three new ladies joined with us and it was a pleasure to welcome them.

At our meeting in October our speaker was Colin Oakes who spoke on Ben Jonson (the man, not the Village pub). He gave us an interesting talk on his plays and poems and how his works were in the shadow of William Shakespeare's.

On the 16th of November we are hearing about the Z to A of Oxford from Richard O'Smith. We are cancelling our meeting on the 21st December as it is so close to Christmas but are getting together for a festive meal earlier in the month. At our meeting on the 18th January we will be off on our travels once again with Pam Newall, this time to Transylvania.

We would like to invite all ladies to join us at our meetings, several are already from Bletchington and other villages. If you are new to either village it's a great way to make new friends, or if you have been here for a long time, give us a try and you will be very welcome.

Our WI meets at Weston Village Hall every month except August, on the third Wednesday at 7.30pm. We also have a craft afternoon on the 4th Monday at 2pm and walks on the 2nd Monday at 1.30pm (both of which were WI initiatives although you don't need to be a member to take part in these). 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

Warm-hearted local welcome to Ukrainian families

HERE IS A LOT of excellent activity going on in this locality, welcoming and supporting Ukrainian families who have had to leave home, family members and jobs to find safety elsewhere. Many of you will have seen the news about the recent concert in Islip to raise funds to support them, - or even been one of the 100 singers. There are very strong support groups in Islip and Bicester offering a whole range of services and gatherings, as well as the fund-raising.

Much is already being done, but the crisis continues. There are many hundreds of Ukrainians still looking for sponsors and hosts in UK, (200 on the Oxford Diocese waiting list alone). Some families whose hosts are unable to have them for longer than 6 months will be needing new places to live near to the community they have joined and the schools in which children are settled.

So there are plenty of opportunities for those who would like to get involved. This could be in a whole variety of ways. Here are just some examples of things needed:

- Lifts to appointments
- Old laptops for re-use
- Space in your home for an individual or family for 6 months
- Support for English language lessons online (training given)
- Help with filling in forms, applications etc
- Befriending, introducing people to their area

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John Howell MP writes...

AVING been through a rather turbulent period I am pleased that we now have Rishi Sunak as our Prime Minister. He has had my support over the months, and I believe that he will be the person to get to grips with the key issues that we face.

It is interesting to reflect on the issues that have been before us in recent months and also the reactions that come forward in the media and indeed in the many emails that I receive. Understandably there are strongly held views and in this time of Remembrance it seems to me that there is plenty of room for shared understanding, moderation and mutual tolerance.

Take for example the attendance of the Prime Minister at COP27. Within a few days of taking office, at a time when there are huge national issues to address, his initial response was that he could not attend due to needing instead to focus on the immediate issues before him. He faced a backlash on that and, once he had been able to assess the workload on his desk, agreed that he could go. However rather than this being seen as a decision based on assessment of the situation it was dubbed as a U turn. If politicians 'stick to their guns' they may be accused of not listening. If they give serious thought to an issue and have a change of heart they are accused of a U turn. Either way there is an accusation to face.

It is good that the Prime Minister has pledged to return to the 2019 manifesto. This is the mandate which was supported through the General Election. It promised an ambitious environmental programme with robust action on climate change and nature loss. It is important to note that protecting



our environment does not mean sacrificing economic growth. It is not 'either or' but 'both and'. Green measures can reduce the cost of living, create employment, investment and export opportunities, and safeguard our long-term prosperity and security. It is also important to ensure that measures taken are affordable and encourage people to make environmentally friendly decisions. There is indeed an urgency in tackling the global issues on climate change and in stopping action that irreparably damages our environment. However, at the same time it is important that people can live without constant worry about providing for their needs and that of their family. The climate targets that leading nations have set through successive conferences are not that far into the future in terms of our ability to do something meaningful. However, for someone struggling to make provision for today or tomorrow they are way distant. We have to do our best to make things genuinely possible.

It is precisely this need to bring people with us that protest groups overlook. People who are in a position to take time out to stop others getting on with their lives leads to focus on the disruption rather than the issues. I fully appreciate that people have strong feelings on certain issues, but it is simply not fair that in making their

voices heard they prevent others from getting to work, business from operating and indeed cause people to mis things such as long-awaited hospital appointments. It also puts pressure on policing which diverts officers from other important duties. It is not about who shouts loudest or makes the grandest gestures but about how we work together to resolve the important issues of our time.

Let us also consider the issue of storm discharges where untreated sewage is released into rivers. I completely agree that sewage pollution is not acceptable but when these discharges of untreated sewage are released into a river it is when water levels exceptionally high and there is risk of flooding to properties. If you live in a property which, as things stand, would be flooded with raw sewage if these discharges were not made this might have a strong influence on your view and the realistic timescales for improvement.

In seeking to work together we need to get beyond the headlines. There will always be differing views on important issues and often some conflicting approaches to similar ends. There is rarely, if ever, a perfect answer. It is good to discuss issues, and sometimes discussion may be heated, but when disagreement turns to abuse and protest causes genuine difficulty to others, we have lost our democratic compass.

Voter Identification - May 2023 Elections

Although things can change (and seem to do so with alarming frequency at the moment!) there is a current plan to require photobased identification for the local elections in May 2023. Although that seems gar away, you will need to have this in order to vote, so your polling card or just popping to the polling station will no longer be accepted. There is more information at https://www.gov.uk/government/news/voter-

identification-faqs but some key points to note:

- There will be a wide range of photographic identification which will be acceptable, including:
 - Various concessionary travel passes
 - PASS cards
 - Ministry of Defence identity cards
 - Photocard parking permits issued as part of the Blue Badge scheme
 - Driver's licenses
 - Passports
 - Free Voter Cards, provided by local authorities
- Expired photographic identification will also be accepted if the photograph is of a good enough likeness to allow polling station staff to confirm the identity of the holder.
- You will need to bring this ID to the polling station to vote

As mentioned, this is subject to change, but we feel making you aware of this, regardless of the political questions around it, is important so do keep an eye out for more information on this and we will advise you how to get a free ID card when we know the process if you don't have anything currently in the list.

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






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
