Chair's comments

'M WRITING THIS REPORT just as the nation is mourning the loss of our Queen. We now have a new head of state and over time we'll get used to saying King Charles and singing the national anthem saying 'him' instead of 'her. With remarkable speed the parish invoked Operation London Bridge and in cooperation with the Church and the Village Hall Committee divided responsibilities. People in the village mourned with friends, sat quietly in the church and took a moment to sign the Book of Condolence. Thank you to those who helped behind the scenes – our village relies on your support at these times.

Heartfelt congratulations to the students who wrote exams in the spring under the trying conditions of being called the 'Covid generation'. They have braved the arduous task of preparing for and writing formal exams, applying to places of further study under conditions no one outside of their generation can really comprehend. Congratulations to each of them as well as to those who actually started university two years ago and have spent a large part of that time at home on their computers. Teaching and learning have changed inalterably and every one of these young people should be very proud of themself.

Serious issues

The Parish Council has met over the summer as we are dealing with some serious issues: planning applications on our doorstep, water restrictions, excessive heat, traffic and the worrying news of the cost of living increases. Day to day concerns have been about barking dogs in the night disturbing neighbours sleep, deep potholes, the drying up of North Lane pond and emergency plans for the village in a heat wave. We take these concerns seriously and understand how people are affected by events and behaviour around their property and neighbourhood.



Referring to the issue of barking dogs, taking a formal complaint to Cherwell District Council is probably the last resort. Dog owners are ultimately responsible for their pets, no one wants an argument, so could we ask for some peace and quiet so neighbours can enjoy their gardens and not be disturbed in the night?

Pot luck!

Our Clerk, Jane Mullane, is very attentive to the concerns about pot holes and has been successful in getting many filled. If you wish to report any highway issue you are able to report it directly at the Fix My Street website: https://fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk/

We all found the heat wave oppressive, and our elderly villagers were especially vulnerable. The Parish Council sprang into action to provide some relief. We provided cool packs and water bottles to as many people as possible. When we discovered that hardly anyone had a fan, we purchased table fans and handheld fans to add to the kit. Those we were especially worried about had a visit when we shared ways of keeping cool. In some cases, there was follow up just to be sure our seniors were safe. We learned that a response to heat needs to be part of our Emergency Plan and currently we are updating our paperwork.

The drying up of the North Lane pond happens most summers. In the past, hoses have piped water into the pond and on two occasions the fire department has come and emptied their water tank to fill it up.

We've had the extra complication of some fish appearing in the pond. We think they were tenches which bury in the mud and are found on the bottom of the pond. They seemed to have disappeared during July. Once the water level got lower, we were checking the pond for signs of the big black fish that was occasionally seen. Sadly, the fish was found by one of our younger girls. It was struggling and the scene was upsetting. The fish was rescued and re-homed successfully. The Parish Council had been reviewing the management of the pond at our October 2020 meeting but of course Covid put an end to this work for two years. We had commissioned a report from an ecologist from the Environment Agency in which he looked at both ponds and made recommendations for their care and there have been regular pond maintenance days. The Parish Council have been discussing the future of the pond – will it be a natural pond, subject to the ebb and flow of seasonal water and allowing the area to be a natural habitat or will return to being an ornamental pond with the maintenance work that has historically gone on with its upkeep?

Biodiversity

Biodiversity issues are now quite key to parish policies and are central to our Neighbourhood Plan. We'll keep the village up to date on our work and invite comments of concern. Can we just say, the Parish Council through its Councillors will not get involved in Facebook chats. It is easy to contact us via our published emails and phone numbers. This is especially important when feelings are running high and blame is easily tossed around.

By the time this magazine is published we will have read a draft of the Cherwell Local Plan and have a clearer idea of expectations for development in the village. Concurrently, our team is working on a review of the Neighbourhood Plan and two of us will be taking advice from other parishes who have gone through the process. Villagers will be updated via email.


An ongoing concern – that of the path under the oak tree – is unresolved at the time of publication of this

The summer months are traditionally slightly quieter in terms of bookings for the Village Hall and the Committee took the opportunity to carry out some renovation works. The first project saw new window sills installed throughout all areas of the Village Hall, making it brighter and lighter. The major work over the summer was the restoration of the floor in the main Hall which was looking tired and worn in places. The work started with a light sanding of the wooden floor and then sealant was applied. Underneath the years of use was a light Canadian Maple floor which now has its wood grain on display. The Committee is really pleased with the restoration and hope villagers will be impressed too. Our final project inside the Hall is the upgrade and replacement of the foyer flooring and we hope this will be completed before Christmas. In the Memorial Garden we have planted some climbing roses and installed a butterfly house and bug hotel to encourage the biodiversity in this area. Our thanks go to Robin for installing these and to Mick (aka the wood fairy) for the kind donation of the bug hotel. As the nights start to draw in the Committee are busy planning a number of events which we hope will appeal to villagers.



Fireworks!

Our main event in October is the annual fireworks display. This will be taking place at the playing field on Saturday 29th October, with the bonfire lit at 6.30pm and the display starting at 7pm. Once again we will be selling mulled wine and hot snacks. The entry to this event is a minimum donation of £1 with any profit going towards next year's display. We know we are biased but we think the display put on by Mark and Mick East is one of the best in Oxfordshire!

Earlier in the month, on Saturday 8th October, between 9 and 10am is the bulb donation event. A few years ago villagers kindly donated spring and summer flower bulbs for the Memorial Garden and we had a riot of colour during the early months of the following year. We are hoping to replenish some of these bulbs and hope we can create another dazzling display of tulips, alliums, primroses and gladioli for the village to enjoy. We are also planning a number of Film Nights for the autumn months and we hope our first screening will be, 'Fisherman's Friends 2: One and All' (certificate 12A). We will be serving a fish and chip supper to accompany this film and once we have the DVD release date confirmed we will start to publicise this event. Please keep an eye out for posters, emails and Facebook posts announcing the date. We hope that villagers will sing their way out of the Hall as they did when we showed the original Fisherman's Friends back in 2019!



he parish had some wonderful Community Service on August 14th 2022, provided by Dalcour Maclaren staff. This company is located at Staplehurst and staff regularly use the Village Pantry and Post Office. On occasion they have a spirted cricket or rounders match in the playing field.

The company has encouraged us to use them for service in the community and so we chose to focus on the children's playground, picnic area and playing field boundaries.

The work was led by Robin Stafford-Allen and supported by Mark Johnson and Eric Bohm.

One of the ongoing issues in the playground has been the uneven edges of the rubberised tarmac. We were advised to try the technique of filling the raised edges with earth and encouraging grass to overgrow.

The equipment in the playground was refreshed. Paint work was waxed and wooden framework was oiled.

Hopefully, there is lots of grass seed trampled into the ridges and our repair will be successful.

The team arrived with lots of equipment including the necessary strimmers and hedge trimmers, shovels, and most importantly, brownies!

An enormous number of brambles were removed, tall grasses grown around poles and up through benches were trimmed.

We had a couple of volunteers from the village as well and some help from two enterprising young boys.

A group of children explained the various issues of making mud at the mud kitchen and we were sure to leave them with lots of extra earth.

We had a wonderful afternoon, and the area looks refreshed!

Weston-on-the-Green WI

Owls, Bees, and Avian Pox!

I'd like to report that the barn owls in our loft are alive and well (and I mean the adult birds, this year's youngsters having left in July). But due to "camera failure" I've not been able to monitor the nest box. I did inspect it in late August and it was empty which allowed me to clean the box out - the debris consisting of owl pellets, half eaten corpses of mice, voles and rats, and thousands of beetle and fly larvae that feed on all this. I have to wear a close-fitting mask whilst I do this as the debris is very dry and dusty and not the sort of thing you'd want to inhale! The new camera will be in-situ when you read this report and it should be giving me guality, coloured pictures from inside the nest-box. I've yet to decide whether or not to "live-stream" the pictures.

I'm aware that other people have been putting up barn-owl nest boxes on land around the edge of the village and there are signs that these are being used by owls for roosting in during the day (and also by kestrels). Back in the 1970/80s, Little Owls were often seen and one family nested in a woodpile at the back of Fir-Tree Farm. I had a "close-encounter" with one in 1986 whilst doing some work at



Knowle Farm after Mrs Gott had died. It was around midnight, and I was in a room where the only piece of furniture was an old sofa. I heard strange noises in the room but couldn't see anything and I immediately thought of "Alice", the resident ghost of Knowle Farm. I eventually plucked up courage to look under the sofa with a torch and I then came face to face with the eyes of a Little Owl that must have fallen down the chimney. Not sure who was the most surprised – me or the owl!

There's no shortage of bird feeders



Thursdays Oct 13th and Nov 10th, 10 - Noon £1.00 for coffee or tea and a biscuit in our garden and we do get a thriving community of birds that come and visit, especially on the peanuts – blue-tit, great-tit, coal-tit, long tailed-tit and very occasionally marsh-tit. Haven't seen a willow-tit for years. Nuthatches do visit now and again. And loads of goldfinches on the nyjer seed feeder. This will sometimes bring in siskin and redpoll in the winter months.

But this summer I noticed two great-tits with strange growths on their wings. I was able to get some decent photographs and I sent these off to the RSPB for comment.

They explained that they thought these birds had avian pox which is a disease caused by a virus and is often found within wild bird populations. They advised me to write to the Garden Wildlife Health Advice group at the Institute of Zoology, Zoological Society of London, which of course I did! They replied that they couldn't reach a definitive diagnosis without peforming an examination of the great tit carcases. However, from the pictures I'd sent they thought that avian poxvirus infection was the most likely cause of such growths. It's been seen in some British garden birds for many years, most commonly affecting species such as the dunnock (hedge-

sparrow), starling, feral pigeon. First noticed in birds of the tit family, especially great-tits, since 2006. The RSPB advised me to clean and disinfect our birdfeeders with a weak bleach solution and not put them out again for a minimum of three weeks, preferably placing them in a different part of the garden – this should also help prevent cross contamination. We've not seen any re-occurrence of this in our garden but let me know if you've seen something similar the Zoological Society would like to know!

Bee plus

Finally – honey bees. My talk to the Weston Society, scheduled for July, didn't take place because of the excessively hot weather and outbreaks of Covid in the village. It was rescheduled for the 12th September meeting which was a few days after the Queen had died. Difficult to talk about bee-keeping without mentioning "gueens"! However I will say that both Charles and Camilla keep bees at Highgrove and Clarence House although whether they will have time to do so now is a different matter. The Highgrove honey is described as "organic" something that we can not describe the honev we sell as we can't control which flowers and crops the bees visit or say that they've never visited flowers in a village garden that have not been sprayed with greenfly killer! But then we don't sell our honey at £25 a jar!!!

From the dusty confines of the Wood Fairy's grotto

Isn't it amazing how a bit of dust highlights the cobwebs!

It's started already, 2 days into September and there were enquiries about kindling. Have you not heard of thermal underwear or pullovers? The Wood Fairy reckons to don at least two additional layers before lighting the fire. Luckily, over the scorchio summer months, a shed full of wood has been put aside for turning into kindling. The first 9 bags were despatched to the shop on 3rd September.

I have 6 big bags of nobby ends, (offcuts from the scroll saw and kindling), approx 10kg each. If you aren't fussy what your kindling looks like these are £10 each with £1 deposit returned on the bag when I get it back. Order from the shop on a first-come-first-served basis.

On a different topic, the Wood Fairy has had a variety of challenges over the summer -replacement fence posts, refurbishment of garden bench and saving the carved rail from a rotten Coronation bench which is now refixed to a new bench in the playing field.



There have been some tricky things as well. Making a new paw for a wooden cat, making finials for chair backs and worst of all putting prickles on hedgehog families. Halloween shapes have been cut ready for October. Also in October the Wood Fairy transforms into the Firework Fairy on the 29th for one night only at the playing field. A host of elves, witches and 2 pyrotechnicians help you to have a great Village bonfire night. See you there.

My deepest sympathies to King Charles III, his Queen Consort and all of the Royal Family at their loss. The affection that Her Majesty showed to all those she met is now reciprocated in the outpouring of grief. She will be sorely missed. May she rest in peace. Long live the King.

An historic week

The House returned from the summer recess on Monday 5th September. It was always going to be an historic week with the incoming of a new Prime Minister on 6th September. The fact that resignation of one Prime Minister and the invitation to another took place at Balmoral instead of the traditional Buckingham Palace was no great surprise as we have seen the frailty of the Queen in recent months. No one questioned the decision of a lady in her 90s asking for others to come to her. Having seen these events at Balmoral only a few days before her death meant that the news of her death came all the more as a shock, her dedication to duty and her service to the nation continuing to the end.

Having had one Monarch for seven decades most of us are seeing events that have not taken place in our lifetime and indeed with the advent of television during the late Queen's reign some of these ceremonies have never before been seen by more than a few. We greet our new King and



indeed, barring tragedy, it will be a King that we welcome for the foreseeable future. It is historic too that a Prime Minister is asked to form a government by one Monarch and to be greeted by another a few days later.

In Parliament normal business was suspended as we entered a period of national mourning. The House sat for two days to enable MPs and Lords to pay tribute to the late Queen, and for oaths to be sworn to His Majesty the King. The Palace of Westminster was prepared for the Lying in State and other procedural and ceremonial events

The timing is such that following the period of national mourning we would be entering the annual period of Party Conferences. However at the time of writing it is not clear whether these will go ahead and thus what the schedule for the sitting of the House will be. By the time this newsletter is published this will have been decided.

New Prime Minister

When the House returns there will be much to do, and our new Prime Minister will be able to proceed with her agenda to address the critical issues that our country faces. It is good that she just managed to squeeze in the key announcement on the support for people in relation to the energy crisis before these historical events took place. This has been widely welcomed.


