Caring for our elderly

Easily the oldest building in our village is the church. It's stood here for many centuries. It's been the scene of tears of joy at countless weddings and tears of sadness at innumerable funerals. It has echoed to the sound of babies and children, of choirs and organs. It has been a place of refuge where anyone can go at any time to share their thoughts and prayers, hopes and fears with their God. It still is all those things and we'd like it to be around for a good while yet. But it is under threat.

The threat doesn't come from blind bureaucracy at 'the centre'. No one in the general Anglican hierarchy or more locally has plans to re-organise our church out of existence or to close it. On the contrary, everyone responsible for it at every level wants it to flourish. But the simple fact is that it costs more to keep it open than the weekly congregation can afford.

Parish share (what we pay to the diocese as our proportion of paying and housing our clergy), heating, lighting, insurance, maintenance and myriad smaller

Harvest

A big thank you to all who decorated our churches for harvest, and who helped prepare harvest lunches, suppers, breakfasts and other events. bills all add up to more than the faithful few in the pews can contribute. External fundraising events: fetes, race nights, 200 clubs, quizzes, all help. But there is still a gap.

Before you reach for your pen or keyboard to demand to know why the wealthy Church of England or the government doesn't pay for the upkeep of our church, here are a couple of facts. The Church of England is wealthy but the money its capital earns each year goes to pay for the training of the clergy of tomorrow, for the pensions of many of the clergy of yesterday, for the upkeep of cathedrals and bishops' staffs and for mission projects around the country. Not, you will note, for the upkeep of individual churches. Government support is largely confined to waiving VAT on some maintenance bills. So responsibility for the 16,000 or so local churches rests, as it almost always has, with local communities.

When there is a need for a capital sum to repair the roof or porch or to install a toilet or automate the clock or replace the pews with chairs, the local community responds with overwhelming generosity. And there are capital grants to help with these things too. But, meanwhile, the drip-drip of ongoing regular financial commitments is wearing away the stone represented by the faithful people who make up the body of the Church.

Could you help? You may only go to church very occasionally or perhaps not at all. But you may value the church for its heritage and for what it still represents. You may have relations lying in the churchyard; perhaps a son or daughter was baptised or married in the church; maybe you have popped in on occasion to reflect or to have a word with God. In the near future a leaflet outlining ways in which you can contribute financially to your church should be in your hands. Please read it, consider its message and act on it if you can.

We do the best we can for our elderly folk even though we know they probably won't be with us for much longer. With the best we can do for our church it will be around for many years to come, still offering everything it did in the past to us and to future generations.

The service will commence in the churchyard at one of the war graves and then process into our church. Our church will be specially decorated for the event. As in the past, the retiring collection will be dedicated



to the Royal British Legion. We hope you will join this important event in the life of our nation.

While it is early, please reserve Saturday, December 9th at 9:30 am for our annual Big Breakfast event at the Village Hall. The cost for a sumptuous breakfast is £7.50 per person. Many people consider the occasion as a great start to their Christmas seasonal festivities.

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Chair's comments

T IS ALWAYS INTERESTING to begin anew in September. Children are beginning a new school year and parents are hoping to get back to some semblance of a schedule. For those of us with older children or grandchildren, there may be opportunities to have a little holiday or just enjoy an Indian summer in our gardens.

For the Parish Council it is a time of tidying up, mowing, strimming and trimming the hedges that have grown wildly over the summer. We continue to need volunteers to help with mowing the playing field and strimming in and around the playing field. We want to avoid increasing the precept which puts an additional tax burden on you and so need villagers to contribute to the maintenance of the village. If these outdoor activities interest you, please call as soon as possible to offer your services (see number for Ben below).

Playground development

Councillor Ben Lanham is our lead for all matters relating to the playing field and spinney and is in the initial stages of gathering ideas around the development of the playground. This project needs to reflect the needs of the village. To know and understand



the wide variety of these ideas, it would work much better to have an advisory group of villagers. You may have small children that love playing outdoors on and around equipment. You may have young teenagers that wish for specific equipment, or you might want more quiet areas for reading or chatting. Ben is meeting with consultants and specialists in playgrounds now and I am sure he would like to share ideas with a team. Please contact him on 07887 836138.

There are two issues that bring the Parish Council to despair and those are the removal of the path around the oak tree and the reduction of the speed limit on the B430. We continue to push on both issues and give credit to our district and county councillors for their support and direct action with lead officers at the district and county offices. By the time you read this article we will have had a meeting about the speed limit – there is agreement to change it, but decisions need to be



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made about what traffic slowing solutions need to be put in place ... and managing the cost. Meanwhile we are pursuing a funding possibility for this project. Action on the oak tree path is promised, the time limit is unknown.

The Food Bank collections

continue to reflect the kindness of people in this village. Your budgets are tightening but you have found a way to help others who are struggling. The last two collections have seen us donate 204.75 kgs of food. That is tremendous!! So many children have benefitted from your generosity over the summer months. Then, of course, we come to harvest!

Local Plan Consultations

Very importantly the Consultation Draft Cherwell Local Plan Review 2040 was considered by the Council's Executive on Monday, 4 September 2023.

The Executive agreed the recommendations and a draft plan will be published for a 6-week

consultation in mid-September (dates to be confirmed).

There are sections of this plan that are key to this village. Councillors will study it and consider a reply to the consultation. Meanwhile, everyone is welcome to read and respond.

High fibre option

Gigaclear continues to work through the village installing the infrastructure for "Fibre to the premises" that should provide faster and more stable broadband to users.

6-month free trial

If you do wish to take Gigaclear, we recommend the "6-month free trial" which you can request when ringing them to sign-up. The number to call is on their website: https://gigaclear.com

This is a completely free-of-charge 6-month trial which you can run alongside your existing copper provider. You will need to provide bank details, but you will only be charged if you do not cancel before the end of the trial.

This allows you to check out Gigaclear (speed, reliability, customer service etc.) before making an informed decision.

Community Hub

The Parish Council has requested to place the free Gigaclear "community hub" into the church. This will allow more modern usage of the church including the live streaming of services and weddings.

Reminders:

We understand that the Government intends to remove copper landlines by 2025, but it is not clear whether this will be achieved.

This is not an endorsement of Gigaclear - the decision is entirely yours.

You need good coverage throughout the house to take advantage of these high speeds. This means good WIFI and/or ethernet cable. Gigaclear provide Linksys WIFI router(s) with their packages.

Within reason, you can choose where the fibre enters your premises for free. You need to have two power sockets within 3' (1m) of the entry point to power the wall-mounted modem and the Linksys router. Our Gigaclear "customer liaison executive" has told us that people on the official vulnerable list can also request a battery backup for free that will keep their connection working during power-outages.

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News from Oxfordshire County Council

Oxfordshire Resident Support Scheme

The County Council has launched a new scheme to support residents who are either in, or at risk of being in crisis, are in need of immediate help and have no other source of financial support available to them. The Resident Support Scheme will help with short-term basic living costs such as food and credit for gas/electric prepayment meters. It can also help in some circumstances with white goods, furniture and clothing. It is intended to meet one-off crisis or emergency need and is not designed to meet any type of ongoing expenses.

The scheme will also signpost residents to other sources of support that are available to ensure that they can get the maximum level of help. There may also be the opportunity for referral for advice/assistance with financial, debt and/or welfare benefits to try and address the resident's long-term needs.

All residents aged 16 years or over are eligible to apply but the council has identified the following groups as a priority to support:

- those experiencing or at risk of domestic abuse
- families with young children
- older people
- people with longer-term illnesses
- people with disabilities
- people with mental health needs
- households with a pregnant person

UR LAST UPDATE, following the Village meeting in July, was a plea for more committee members. We are delighted to report an expanded committee with some valuable additional expertise on the business and financial side. We are delighted to have Linda, who brings a wealth of experience with the Post Office as a possible Postmistress. We now have four, and hopefully five new members in addition to the four from the initial committee, so we are again a viable group. It is great to have the support of Amanda, who in addition to her business expertise, is able to represent the view from Middleton Stoney.

Beyond Weston

Forty-five percent of the survey returns were from surrounding villages, indicating the importance of the shop and post office beyond Weston. Incidentally, if you were not able to make the last village meeting you can find the slides, with the summary survey results, on our website: https://westonsos.org/public-consultation-meeting-a-call-to-action or open the link to the item in the news section.

As we outlined at the July Village meeting, our initial work was to identify the most viable option which was to establish a 'Community Benefit Society', which has been registered with the Financial Conduct Authority. We are continuing to work on the business plan to ensure that our plans for the shop and post office are financially viable. The plans include renovations to rent out the flat above the shop to increase the income. Sam, our Chair, is leading on the business plan with incredible energy and commitment, and we are working with valuable support from Nathan Brown, a professional adviser paid

for by a Government Community Ownership Fund startup grant which Sam secured.

The business plan is needed both to apply for a full grant from the Government Community Ownership Fund, of £250,000 and to gain the 'Community Shares Standard Mark' so that all of you who buy shares in the community shop and post-office can do so with confidence. We are grateful to those of you who have already completed the pledge forms (blanks are available from the village shop, but strictly confidential once completed).

Chicken and egg

We are in a 'chicken and egg' situation, in trying to assess how much money might be forthcoming for community shares. This clearly impacts on the business plan and how much we might need to borrow; we need a minimum of £100,000 from the community shares from Weston and beyond. A pledge is a little more commitment than any figure you might have indicated in the survey, as we are asking for your name and Sam will contact you when the shares are ready. However, a pledge is not yet an obligation to buy as you would

clearly want to see the business plan and the formal share offer before you actually hand over any money.


The survey did not capture everyone in the Village, but 60% of those responding to the question did express an interest in buying shares which we found encouraging. When we presented to the Village in July, we had hoped we might be eligible for Seed Enterprise Investment Scheme (SEIS) which gives generous tax relief; unfortunately, as we are taking over a business, we seem not to be eligible.

For future presentation

We are still interested in additional support, particularly with administration (minutetaking), media/public relations. SO WHY ARE POST OF

OST OFFICE LTD (POL) is the largest retailer in the UK and operates through a very complicated system. Apart from their directly run main branches, there is a web across the land keeping Post Offices alive through Sub-Postmasters (SP) who are contracted to them in several different ways:


- Community Contract which is what we have at Weston. POL pay the SP a monthly fee to keep the office open plus commission. Its future is dependent on the SP, and POL cannot close it down, though news of very small branches having received a 26-months' notice to hand back their contract is filtering through communications we receive from the SP union, the National Federation of Sub-Postmasters (NFSP). These branches also act as your high street bank.
- **Old Contract** which is similar to the Community Contract but with less guarantees.
- Local Contract whereby the branch only receives commission on the work they do with restrictive banking services which is very difficult to sustain in small villages unless community owned and ran by volunteers. This model would be difficult maintain in Weston given the demand for high volume banking.

Then there is the whole thing that started with branches moving into the Co-op which can only be described as a combination of the old and local contract. As the Co-op have to pay the staff to operate the PO, the expansion of this programme has been on hold for some time.

The word on the grapevine is POL have marked all of the Old and Community Contracts as either 'Withdraw' or 'Go Local' and intend to build the network back up to 11,500 branches by placing Drop & Collect Stations in local shops and call them a 'Post Office' as they have currently done in the Co-op in Bletchington.

These Drop and Collect stations are NOT proper Post Offices, they are purely a scanning service to drop off pre-paid mail or collect and nothing more.

One local SP with an Old contract has been trying to sell her leasehold on the open market for 18 months and has had 3 prospective buyers rejected by POL



Customer feedback has been amazing, far outstripping many other branches in the area. Josh Richardson, PO Area Manager

Another SP in the region with a Community Contract like ours in a beautiful freehold building with fantastic accommodation has been on the open market for nearly a year and hasn't even had an applicant get to the POL stage. Yet all Local Contracts in towns and large villages have been selling like hot cakes as leaseholds.

Anybody looking for a lifestyle change and taking up running a village PO and shop are looking much

ek are closing, wrenching the heart out of communities. ring the network back up to 11,500 branches.

FICES STILL CLOSING?



How this affects Weston Post Office and Pantry

Having spoken to other SPs in the area at length and the NFSP who track the data and trends across the country, I have made the decision not to waste £500 in up-front listing fees with the commercial agents to test a market which is speaking for itself.

I have also spoken to one of the heads of departments at POL that handle PO ownership transfers and have been told that the PO in Weston on the Green has been marked as 'Go Local' but they will honour the community contract IF I was able to sell to someone that had been approved by the PO - in other words to someone who was financially bullet proof.

During this conversation, I got the very strong impression POL would rather I closed thus forcing them to find somewhere within a 3-mile radius to open their preferred option of a Local Office.

It will be interesting to see under which contract they will market the post.

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ARTS HAVE BEEN PLAYED in Weston for many years. Dad used to play at the Chequers when it was run by the Bowles family. At that time the pub looked a lot different with the new bar and extension not even thought about. This memory is from the early 70s until the pubs became restaurants.

I started playing in the Ben on a Sunday lunchtime in the late 60s. We then joined the Cherwell League to play during the week.

To achieve compliance with regulations we had to increase the height of the throw. I believe this was when John Heard was landlord. This was achieved by breaking out an oblong in the floor some 6" deep. A breaker was borrowed from work and several of us youngsters broke out the floor on a Saturday morning. The bottom was concreted to give a flat standing area. This not only gave us the required ceiling room but ensured that no-one could step over the Oche. It took a while, but you soon learned to step up before walking forward to retrieve your darts. When not in use a timber and ply box was dropped

in the hole. This was filled in much later under a new landlord. New tiling can still be seen in the floor of what used to be the tap room, just by the window seat.

This room on a Sunday lunchtime was filled with dart players, cribbage players on one table and domino players on a table where the hole in the wall now leads to the kitchen and dining room. They played either penny spot or penny knock. There was even a space invaders machine behind the dart throw. The new landlord, Jonno, remembers playing darts from the hole in the floor.

When Patrick became landlord of the Chequers we played down there. The dartboard was sited on the back wall between the kitchen and living room doors. Here we played in the Cherwell League, proper darts known as DODO where it was double on, double out. There was the opportunity to brush your opponent, i.e get out on a double before they had got a double to start. EODO Easy on was only for the Ladies darts and latterly for televised comps. Still not proper darts. Each player

played three legs with a point per leg for the team. A team consisted of six players, so it was possible to win eighteen nil, or lose eighteen nil. The winter 83/84 cards came to light whilst I was sorting out old photos in a damp windy July. The Cherwell League covered Bicester and the surrounding villages.

The players are listed as: Patrick Bennett (Chequers Landlord); Dave Pearson; Nigel Cound; Mick Parker; Mick Mitchell; Ian Kerry; Mick East; John Spittle; Bert East; and Len Fellows:

The two pubs used to have an annual contest, playing darts and dominoes culminating in the landlords drinking a yard of ale. This however stopped when Patrick moved away from the village.

On a separate topic, the Village Hall has just had its 50th anniversary. When they were collecting for the hall to be built, Jack Smith asked me for a contribution. He didn't see the funny side when he was offered an LBC Dapple Light (a house brick.)

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John Howell MP writes...

UST AS SCHOOLS were due to return, and the sunshine that many had been longing for came, we hit the problem of the safety of school buildings due to concerns over reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC). The potential disruption to education and the timing of the problem caused inevitable and understandable frustration. The Department for Education had been working to identify buildings which may have RAAC over the last year and the advice had been to take RAAC areas out of use immediately if assessed by surveyors as 'critical'. Where they were assessed by surveyors as 'non-critical', the risk was not considered sufficient to require that these spaces be taken out of use. However, that position changed following cases that came to light over the summer and at the end of August the Department for Education advised all establishments with buildings with RAAC confirmed by a surveyor to take the affected space out of use until suitable mitigations have been put in place. I think that this was a sensible precautionary step to protect the safety of everyone whilst adequate mitigations are being put in place. Not to have done so would have created an unacceptable risk with potentially dire consequences. Whilst the concern was widespread thankfully once the list of affected places was published I was relieved to see that no schools in this constituency were affected.

Following the media coverage of the introduction of Ultra Low Emission Zones (ULEZ) I received a number of emails from constituents raising concerns on what is being seen by some as a war on motorists. I appreciate that a number of residents in this area do travel to London on a regular basis. Clean Air Zones focus on



vehicle emissions and have a specific target of trying to improve air quality in problem areas with specific focus on tackling NO2 there levels breach legal limits. The ULEZ in London means that for those who do not have a compatible vehicle there is now a charge of £12.50 a day to drive in these zones. As we have seen in the High Court challenge the size of the zone and the unavoidable negative economic impact on some residents makes the scheme contentious. The decision to introduce the scheme was entirely that of the Mayor of London, is funded through local taxation and not one over which Parliament has any say. The media reports of the Mayor of London seeking to hide research from Imperial College that questioned the beneficial environmental impact of the scheme simply led to the claims that it is nothing more than an antimotorist cash cow. It is not difficult to see why motorists feel that 'war' is being declared on them.

From early days as an MP I have been very clear that in a rural area such as the Henley Constituency a car is not a luxury; it is an essential means of transport both locally and indeed for longer journeys where practical alternatives do not exist. Whilst we can argue for more public transport the geography and nature of people movement will always make it a

challenge to provide an efficient and economic system that meets the diverse travel needs. We need, as always, to find a balance and do our best to bring people with us on change. Sadly when measures are introduced that seem to be excessive it leads to other more genuine measures being challenged too. Tackling air pollution is nothing new. Since the middle of the 20th century regulatory frameworks have tried to address such issues and as we have learned more so this has been refined. The most recent Government Clean Air Strategy 2019 complements the Industrial Strategy, the Clean Growth strategy and the 25 Year Environment Plan. However the whole strategy is not just aimed at motorists, it is much wider.

I know that that online safety is a concern for many constituents, especially parents. The Online Safety Bill, which seeks to make the UK the safest place to go online has been some time in going through parliamentary process due to some concerns on over restriction. Some people called for it to be completely dropped. At the end of last year MPs agreed to recommit certain Clauses and Schedules of the Bill to further scrutiny. The Bill finally completed its stages in the House of Lords earlier this month and returned to the Commons with amendments. I am hoping that it will be passed by the time this newsletter is published as there is a need to better protect children online.

Full Council 17th July 2023

The Full Council of Cherwell District Council took place on the 17th July. At this council six motions were passed unanimously confirming Cherwell's

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commitment to the following:

- Draw up a cost of living action plan within the next 100 days
- Give careful consideration to keeping open the rail crossing at Sandy Lane in Yarnton
- Continue to fund resources into Cherwell's active lifestyle schemes
- Run a public awareness campaign to ensure tenants are aware of their rights
- Reaffirm the council's support for the NHS and to call on the government to do more to ensure that it is properly funded and maintained.
- Look at how Cherwell can encourage people not to litter across our villages and how it can support keeping areas tidy.

Parliamentary Boundary Changes

As many of you may have seen, the Boundary Commissions has published its final report. This means that all of the Launton and Otmoor ward will move into the new Bicester and Woodstock constituency seat at the next parliamentary election. MedicAlert and Thames Valley Police: Introducing Safe and Found

There are currently 944,000 people living with dementia in the UK. On average, around 40,000 are reported missing every year.

The MedicAlert Foundation, in partnership with Thames Valley Police, have launched a dementia safeguarding programme, Safe and Found. This new initiative supports those living with dementia and other memory or cognitive conditions.

Safe and Found is available nationally and enables people living with dementia to securely store their Herbert Protocol form digitally. This document contains information that aids a missing person search, giving the police a better understanding of who they are looking for, what they have done previously and what they may be likely to do in the future. It includes places of importance, routines and habits, their connections, medical details and more.

The Herbert Protocol is a proven strategy in reducing search time and increasing the chance of the individual being found safe and well. MedicAlert is helping to speed up the process by providing quick access to this critical information in an emergency.

Chief Superintendent Mike Loebenberg from Thames Valley Police said: "When a family member or friend goes missing, it is an incredibly distressing time for those desperate to know where they are. This fear and distress is exacerbated when that individual is living with dementia.

"Completing and keeping an up to date Herbert Protocol form printed or saved and easily accessible is really important, but we know this can be challenging. MedicAlert is a service that can help, by storing information and working to keep it up to date and accessible for officers if it is needed.

"As a MedicAlert member myself, I know this partnership will provide loved ones with peace of mind that Thames Valley Police can access important information quickly and save time in the search for those missing. I hope this offers reassurance to those living with dementia and their families."

The support of The McLay Dementia Trust makes the Safe and Found programme even more accessible.

MedicAlert and The McLay Dementia Trust will be providing the first year of MedicAlert membership free to anyone living with dementia in the UK.

"The MedicAlert charity is making dementia a priority. We are very proud to work with Thames Valley Police and The McLay Dementia Trust. These partnerships ensure you can feel safer and more comfortable to continue being active, socialising, and living well with dementia. Wherever you go, we will be with you." says Mark Hacker, MedicAlert CEO.

"MedicAlert has also launched the Carer ID and storage of Emergency Care Plans to support carers. This ensures that, should a carer have an accident, their loved one receives appropriate and continuous care."
